Rules

1. Do not pen your rabbits until you have checked in with the Rabbit Superintendent. The superintendent will have a list of rabbits that have been entered. If there are any rabbits entered in error, corrections should be made immediately. The show will run faster and ribbons may be awarded at the end of each show.
2. "Any Other Purebred" rabbit entered should look like the breed it is representing.
3. If an animal is shown in fur class, it must be shown in its respective breed class. Animals disqualified for reasons other than health may still show in fur class. Fryer fur animals should be shown out of a meat pen only.
4. Exhibitors must be present to assist during the judging of their animals.
5. There will be cages for each exhibitor, however, if you bring a very large number of rabbits, they may not all be caged at the Fair. Bring only the rabbits you have entered in the Fair. No cages will be provided for additional rabbits.
6. No private sales may occur until release.
7. Exhibitors are encouraged to secure their rabbit cages.
8. Sale of cages or rabbit equipment will not be allowed in the barns; you may purchase a commercial vendor space to accommodate business transactions.
9. You must clean your cages prior to leaving the Fair.

Meat Pen Rabbits

Rules

1. Rabbits entered in Class 1 must be separate rabbits from other classes. Age – up to 70 days. Rabbits must weigh between 3 and 5 lbs and all three rabbits should be as close to the same weight as possible. Those not meeting the weight and age requirements will not qualify as meat pens. It is suggested that all market rabbits be of the same breed and uniform in color.
2. REMINDER: ALL MEAT PENS WILL BE WEIGHED IN THE RABBIT BARN. MEAT PENS NOT MEETING THE ABOVE REQUIREMENTS WILL NOT SELL.
3. Each exhibitor may sell one pen of three (3) market rabbits at the Junior Livestock Sale.
4. Consult the Junior Livestock Sale Coordinator for information on processing your rabbits for your buyer.

Rules

1. ELIGIBILITY OF FLEECES:
 - a) Each fleece entered must have been grown by a Fremont County 4-H or FFA member and be from sheep recognized as part of the current project work. Fleece shall not have shown in a previous year at Fair.
 - b) Each fleece must represent not more than 12 months of growth, except that in the case of yearling fleeces, 16 months of growth will be allowed.
2. QUALIFICATIONS: Any fleece entered in competition shall be discriminated against if:
 - a) Tied with other than paper twine
 - b) Showing any paint or tar brands (soluble branding flu ids are permissible)
 - c) Showing excessive dung locks or tags
 - d) Discolored by excessive moisture
 - e) Cotted
 - f) Showing weak staple or break in fiber
 - g) Contains an excess of burrs or other vegetable matter
3. PREPARATION OF FLEECES: Spread out the fleece on a clean table or floor, skin side down , take care not to dull or open fleece as it is handled. The fleece will look like a pelt. At this stage, before rolling or tying, remove all heavy tags, stained wool and obvious foreign matter. Rolling the fleece takes four easy steps:
 - 1) Begin at one side and loosely fold 8 to 10 inches of the edge toward the center of the fleece.
 - 2) Do the same on the other side, but fold toward the center two times until twice folded portion lies on top of first fold.
 - 3) Fold in the head wool
 - 4) Roll the entire fleece from the breach toward the shoulder and long side wool. Fleece in now ready to tie. Using paper fleece twine, wrap it in two directions and tie as you would a package. There should be no loose ends hanging from the fleece. It should be loose enough to make judging easy, yet compact enough to prevent it from falling apart when handled.

General Rules

1. Please review Junior Livestock Rules for Fair in the catalog.
2. Please review Please review the current Wyoming Junior Horse Show rule book. All rules of the current book will apply unless superseded by specific rules stated in this catalog.
3. Halter classes will be judged on the American System and rib bons will be awarded. Breed Champions may be selected, but there will be no overall champion selected.
4. No more than 25 entrants at one time will be allowed to show in any showmanship or performance classes.
5. Horse exhibitors who would like a horse stall must turn in a stall application to their community leader. Those exhibitors who must travel a long distance will be given first priority to stall horses on the grounds during the show. Stall assignments will be made by the superintendent.
6. In halter classes, no more than two horses in a class may be exhibited by any single exhibitor. Only one entry per class may be made in a performance class.
7. Exhibitors must be able to control their horses on the grounds and in the show ring; otherwise the animals will be disqualified and must be removed from the grounds.
8. Any protest must be lodged at the time of the infraction. Disqualification in the ring will be made prior to class placement. The superintendent will be responsible for rule enforcement.
9. 4-H and FFA members competing in this division must certify that they have owned or leased their horses by no later than May 1, 2010 and the lease is to be for one full year.
10. Halter classes: In reference to horse's age, its birthday should be considered as being January 1 of the year in which it was born, and it then becomes a year old on January 1 of the year following its birth. For example: A foal born any time in 2009 will be a yearling on January 1, 2010. If born anytime in 2008 it will be a two year old on January 1, 2010.
11. All quality animals in halter classes are eligible to show at the Wyoming State Fair. All horses entered in Halter and
