AGRICULTURE MECHANICS

Rules

1. There will be no double entries by a chapter.
2. Entries will be judged on the basis of workmanship, evidence of

sound planning, number and degree of skills involved, practicality and agricultural usefulness of the entry.

3. All entries must be student's work and result from the training program in Agriculture Mechanics.
4. The judges reserve the right to re-enter entries in Classes in order to group entries for judging.
5. Judges shall give greater consideration to an item built entirely by the student rather than a pre-fabricated item.
6. Entries in Classes 1-6 must be mounted on display boards that may be any size less than 2' x 4'. Display boards may represent several students' work. Points from these Classes will have equal value with other similar classes in judging sweepstakes. Individual item not mounted will not be judged. Boards not meeting the specifications will be placed lower than those boards that do.
7. All entries must be removed from equipment and placed in proper Class area to be judged. Example: pickup bumpers and stock racks.
8. All projects not of quality will not be judged. This will be left to the discretion of the judge(s). The items must be removed from the display area.
9. Only major Agriculture Mechanics projects pertaining to the handling or producing of crops or livestock or major shop equipment shall be considered for Champion or Reserve Champion Agriculture Mechanics projects.
10. Any entries in the Agriculture Mechanics Class that are found to have been shown in previous years will disqualify that chapter for all premiums for the current year in the Agriculture Mechanics show. The Agriculture mechanics committee shall have the responsibility for making this decision.
11. Each local FFA chapter is invited to exhibit agricultural and other project material in the FFA booth.
12. FFA chapters will be assigned a block of exhibitor numbers.

AGRONOMY

Rules

1. All samples of threshed grain and sheaf samples must conform to the size and specifications listed below. All sheaf samples must be attractively tied in three places with blue or gold (yellow) ties. Sheaf grain and forage for seed, leaves should be stripped. Samples must be with _ " of the size specified to receive a blue or red ribbon.

- All crop entries prepared and exhibited for competition must have been prepared by the student.
- No more than two entries per member may be made in each Class and must be grown in the current crop year, except in the case of corn, threshed forage seed and beans.
- Judging will be on the Danish System.
- Agronomy exhibits may be gathered from areas outside the Supervised Farming Projects.
- All crop entries prepared and exhibited for competition must have been prepared by the student.

4. Classes may be sorted at the discretion of the Judge(s).
5. Refer to General Policies #19.
6. No multiple year notebooks.

6. Canning: Use the updated USDA prescribed method.
7. Gardening entries must have been grown in Wyoming by the person who enters the exhibit.
8. Collections may be entered in consecutive years, provided new additions are dated properly.
